

“America’s Report Card on the Environment”

A New Annual Survey by

The Woods Institute for the Environment at Stanford University

in collaboration with ABC News and Time Magazine

According to the first annual installment of a new national survey, majorities of Americans are pessimistic about the state of the natural environment and want a lot to be done to improve its health.

Most Americans Are Pessimistic

55% of Americans said they expect the world’s natural environment to be in worse shape in 10 years than it is now, and an additional 5% said the environment is currently in poor or very poor shape and will not improve. We refer to this group of 60% of Americans as “pessimists.”

These pessimists closely resemble the entire American public in terms of gender, race, education, and whether they live in an urban, suburban, or rural setting. But current partisan loyalties are related to pessimism: Democrats are more likely to be pessimistic than Republicans. 67% of Democrats are pessimists vs. 48% of Republicans.

Among pessimists, however, Democrats outnumber Republicans and Independents by only small margins (35%, 25%, and 29%, respectively).

Tremendous Remedial Effort is Desired


A striking 86% want a great deal or a lot to be done to help the environment during the next year, by President Bush, the U.S. Congress, American businesses, and/or the American public.

This figure was 94% among Democrats and 76% among Republicans. The proportion of people wanting a great deal or a lot of effort did not vary according to gender, age, race, education, or residence in an urban, suburban, or rural place.

Whereas only 8% of Americans believe that President Bush did a great deal or a lot to help the environment during the past year, 73% want him to do a great deal or a lot to help the environment during the next year.

Likewise, whereas only 8% of Americans believe that U.S. businesses did a great deal or a lot to help the environment during the past year, 76% want them to do a great deal or a lot to help the environment during the next year.

In addition, 75% and 77% of Americans believe that Congress and the American public, respectively, should do a great deal or a lot to help the environment during the next year.



Businesses are Blamed Most

Nearly all Americans agree that environmental damage is at least partly attributable to the actions of American businesses. 91% said that businesses harmed the environment a little or more during the past year, a view expressed equivalently often by Republicans and Democrats (90% vs. 93%).

A large majority (79%) also said that President Bush's policies harmed the environment a little or more during the past year, but there was a substantial partisan split on this question. Democrats were substantially more likely than Republicans to attribute blame to President Bush (89% vs. 66%). Nonetheless, even a majority of Republicans acknowledged some environmental damage attributable to the President.

Businesses and the President Have Helped Less Than They Have Harmed

Smaller but nonetheless large numbers of Americans said that American businesses and President Bush's policies did at least a little to help the environment during the last year (83% and 62%, respectively).

Whereas 46% of respondents said that businesses did more to harm the environment than to help it, less than half that number (20%) said businesses did more to help than to harm it.¹

Likewise, whereas 46% of respondents said that President Bush's policies did more to harm the environment than to help it, about half that number (27%) said the President's policies did more to help than to harm it.²

Low Approval of Environmental Stewardship by the President, Congress, and Businesses

Only 21% of Americans approve of the way President Bush is handling environmental issues.³

As expected, approval was much lower, a mere 5%, among Democrats, but not even a majority of Republicans (47%) approved of the president's performance on this issue.

Americans' approval of Congress and U.S. businesses is no higher: 15% and 21%, respectively.⁴

Pessimism Linked to Views on Global Warming

Pessimism about the health of the natural environment is strongly related to beliefs about global warming.

Among the 69% of Americans who are at least somewhat sure that global warming has been happening and believe that it will have at least somewhat serious effects if unchecked, 70% are pessimists about the environment in general.


Among the 31% of Americans who are skeptical about the existence or damaging effects of global warming, only 37% are environmental pessimists.

Conclusions

- 1) A majority of Americans is pessimistic about the health of the world's natural environment, believing it will get worse or is in poor shape and will not improve.
- 2) A large majority of Americans want a substantial increase in effort to help the environment.
- 3) Blame for poor and declining environmental conditions is frequently placed on American businesses, and to a lesser degree on President Bush's policies.
- 4) People who believe in the existence and damaging effects of global warming are especially likely to be pessimistic about the environment's future.
- 5) Despite partisan splits on many of these issues (Democrats are more pessimistic and more supportive of remedial efforts than Republicans), even majorities of Republicans share discontent about the health of the environment and human stewardship of it.

METHODOLOGY – This survey, the first annual installment of “America’s Report Card on the Environment,” is modeled after the well-known national surveys measuring Americans’ perceptions of the national economy, which yield the well-known economic indicators.

The survey was conducted by telephone March 9-14, 2006, among a random national sample of 1,002 adults. Sampling and data collection were done by TNS of Horsham, PA.
